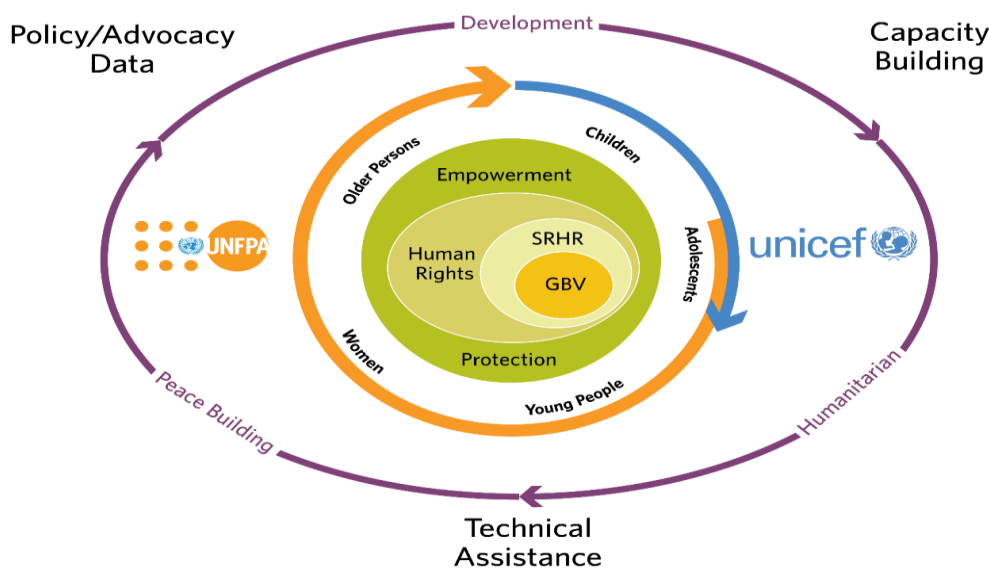


## Health, Empowerment and Rights (HER) Programme

The joint programme addresses the holistic needs of women, young people, girls and boys by both strengthening access to GBV and SRHR services, and providing the means to support the realization of women’s and children’s human rights, including the sexual and reproductive health and rights and the right to be free from violence. The partnership between UNFPA and UNICEF is formed in recognition of the critical reproductive health and gender based violence needs to support women and girls, in particular, through their lifecycle. The key focus of the partnership is placed on empowerment through provision of services simultaneous to national policy and systems strengthening.



UNFPA will lead the implementation of Outcome 1, output 1.4.1 and Outcome 2 and 3 overall.

<p><b>Intermediate Outcome 1</b> - Enhanced protection and response to sexual and gender-based violence in Myanmar for young people, girls and boys.</p>	
<p><b>Immediate Outcome 1.1</b></p>	<p><b>Evidence based policy and legal framework in place to address sexual and gender based violence against boys and girls.</b></p>

Output 1.1.1	A strengthened normative framework in place for the protection of girls and boys from all forms of violence and exploitation, including gender based violence.
Activities	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Develop a national child protection policy and national action plan for the elimination of violence against girls and boys, with a strong focus on gender based violence, led by Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement;</li> <li>2. Develop rules and procedures for the new provisions of the revised Child Law.</li> </ol>
Output 1.1.2	A functioning knowledge and information management and monitoring system in place to ensure quality evidence on violence against girls and boys, generated and accessible.
Activities	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Support the Government to ensure comprehensive and harmonized information management system on gender based violence against girls and boys;</li> <li>2. Support the Government to ensure a comprehensive social work case management system including gender based violence and all other forms of violence against girls and boys;</li> <li>3. Support the Government to conduct a national study on violence against girls and boys, including gender based violence;</li> <li>4. Support a situation analysis of accessibility to medical services for child survivors in humanitarian settings (humanitarian case workers, DSW social workers and medical social workers).</li> </ol>
<b>Immediate Outcome 1.2</b>	<b>Harmonized, age- and gender-sensitive sectorial and inter-sectorial operational frameworks to respond to sexual and gender based violence against young people, girls and boys in Myanmar, with specific attention to humanitarian settings.</b>
Output 1.2.1	Harmonised operational frameworks to ensure sectoral and inter-sectoral coordination are in place in response to SGBV and other forms of violence against girls and boys.

Activities	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Develop the Inter-Agency Standard Operational Procedures (SOPs) between health, justice and social welfare sectors in response to child sexual abuse, including gender based violence;</li> <li>2. Develop or enhance sectoral Standard Operating Procedures and guidelines of responding to cases of SGBV and other forms of violence against girls and boys for law enforcement and justice systems.</li> </ol>
Output 1.2.2	Coordination mechanisms at national and sub-national level on addressing violence against girls and boys, with specific focus in humanitarian settings, are strengthened.
Activities	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Support the inter-ministerial coordination capacity in addressing all forms of violence against women, girls and boys through strengthening the role of child rights committee at national and sub-national level;</li> <li>2. Support the coordination between state and non-state actors at national and sub-national levels through women and children related committees, working groups and platforms in addressing all forms of violence against girls and boys;</li> <li>3. Lead the coordination on child protection sub sectors and working groups (field and national level) and child protection responses in collaboration with local and civil society organization;</li> <li>4. Support the coordination capacity of the NSPAW technical working group on violence against women and children.</li> </ol>
<b>Immediate Outcome 1.3</b>	<b>Strengthened capacity of systems and state and non-state actors to provide quality response to sexual and gender based violence against young people, girls and boys, including in humanitarian settings.</b>
Output 1.3.1	Capacity of staff of social welfare, health, education, prosecution and judiciary on issues related to child protection (including SGBV against children) are further enhanced.

Activities	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Revise pre-service and in-service training package for staff of DSW, health, education, prosecution and the judiciary;</li> <li>2. Develop and roll out training modules on child protection and referral to social work case management system for staff of DSW, health, education, prosecution and the judiciary;</li> <li>3. Develop and roll out training modules on specialized child protection knowledge and skills (including child and gender centered approaches) for staff of DSW, health, education, prosecution and the judiciary;</li> <li>4. Training of medical social workers to provide PSS response, including the revision of TORs and SOPs related to medical social work in responding to child protection cases</li> </ol>
Output 1.3.2	Capacity of community based case management systems for non-state/humanitarian actors further enhanced in line with provision of quality child protection services.
	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Training of local community members, humanitarian actors on child protection (including SGBV) prevention, services and referral pathways;</li> <li>2. Capacity building of community management/leaders on the principles, case management tools and referral pathways - with specific focus on confidentiality with respect to child protection cases;</li> <li>3. Conduct community based dialogue on violence against children as well as the availability and accessibility of supporting services.</li> </ol>
Output 1.3.3	Linkages established and strengthened between local civil society groups, NGO and the Government to ensure prevention and response to SGBV and other forms of violence against girls and boys.
Activities	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Capacity building for local civil society groups and NGOs to provide case management, referral and response to support girls and boys;</li> <li>2. Dissemination of information (brochures, flyers, handbooks) on DSW and NGO case management system and referral pathways in health, social welfare and justice sector;</li> <li>3. Conduct a series of consultations among the authorities, communities and youth groups on improving access to legal response and support in line with best interests of the child.</li> </ol>

<b>Immediate Outcome 1.4</b>	<b>Increased ability of women, youth and adolescent networks to engage in advocacy and behavior change campaigns related to addressing SGBV, reproductive health and rights.</b>
<b>Output 1.4.1</b>	A national Youth and Adolescent Platform supported by a consortium of local organizations and networks is established to empower adolescents and young people and promote access to gender based violence, sexual and reproductive health rights information and services
<b>Activities</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Conduct a mapping of relevant local organisations and civil society groups at national and sub-national level;</li> <li>2. Establish a consortium of local organisations at State/Regional level including CBOs and civil society groups to form the Adolescent and Youth Platform at the national level;</li> <li>3. Build capacity of the local consortia on thematic areas including children and women’s rights, child protection, GBV, violence prevention, sexual reproductive health;</li> <li>4. Work with the adolescent and youth platform and local consortia to generate evidence on adolescent life experience;</li> <li>5. Establish a mechanism to exchange information and feedback between the Adolescent and Youth Platform key decision-makers.</li> </ol>
<b>Output 1.4.2</b>	Adolescent networks, community groups and leaders are supported to engage in behavior change to facilitate access of adolescent girls to basic services in humanitarian settings, including Rakhine and Kachin states.

<p>Activities</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Community events and awareness raising sessions organized to strengthen relationships between key stakeholders and the children, to improve trust and access for boys and girls;</li> <li>2. Empower Youth groups to advocate for prevention of violence and abuses and the access of girls to basic services;</li> <li>3. Support community-based violence prevention interventions targeting adolescents in humanitarian settings, with special focus on disclosure and help-seeking behavior;</li> <li>4. Organize and train peer educators to increase community awareness against GBV;</li> <li>5. Use of media outlets to disseminate information through youth/adolescents networks.</li> <li>6. Orient/Raise awareness of men groups, township committees on child rights (including GBV);</li> <li>7. Ensure participation of men, community and religious leaders in days of activism.</li> </ol>
<p><b>Immediate Outcome 1.5 (change in capacities of intermediaries or beneficiaries)</b></p>	<p><b>Increased availability of age- and gender-appropriate services for girls and boys subject to violence, including SGBV, and in need of protection.</b></p>
<p>Output 1.5.1</p>	<p>Girls and boys who are subject to violence and in need of protection have access to alternative care arrangements, including in humanitarian settings.</p>
	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Conduct awareness raising in communities and child protection actors on prevention of family separation and alternative care for children deprived of parental care;</li> <li>2. Introduce and roll out of alternative care models, including emergency foster care, regulated kinship care, independent living arrangements for children deprived of parental care, including in humanitarian settings;</li> <li>3. Develop training package and monitoring tools of different forms of alternative care arrangements for state and non-state child protection actors;</li> <li>4. Develop guidelines of alternative care arrangements in humanitarian settings</li> </ol>

Output 1.5.2	Boys and girls subject to violence and in need of protection have access to mental health and psychosocial support, including in humanitarian settings through safe spaces developed in line with existing community networks.

Provide opportunities for children to play, acquire age, gender and culturally appropriate physical and cognitive stimulation, contextually relevant skills and receive social support services;</li> <li>2. Strengthen case management services for children who are survivors of abuse including gender based violence</li> <li>3. Provide adolescents affected by the current crisis with life skills training, evidence-informed violence prevention activities, and information on grave violations against children, unsafe migration, trafficking and other negative coping mechanisms</li> <li>4. Engagement of community leaders and parents to support access of girls (especially in Rakhine) and boys (especially in Kachin) to these safe space activities.</li> </ol>
<p><b>Intermediate Outcome 2: Enhanced protection and promotion of sexual and reproductive health and rights of women, young people, girls and boys by state and non-state actors</b></p>	
<p><b>Immediate Outcome 2.1</b></p>	Rights based, gender responsive, comprehensive sexuality education module, aligned with international standards, adopted by the Government of Myanmar for young people in and out of school
Output 2.1.1	Comprehensive Sexuality Education module developed in accordance with international standards
Activities	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Provision of technical assistance to the development of inclusive CSE modules in compliance with international standards for in- and- out of school youth and adolescents including training manuals and guidelines for CSE implementation.</li> <li>2. Support coordination with Government, UN and international organizations, civil society and local partners to ensure continual cycle of engagement</li> <li>3. Consultations with practitioners, teachers, parents, Government, civil society, youth platforms as well as adolescents and youth.</li> </ol>

Output 2.1.2	Costed implementation plan for Comprehensive Sexuality Education for in and out of school youth
Activities	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Technical assistance for the development of a costed implementation plan that is gender responsive</li> <li>2. Advocacy interventions to ensure political support and leadership at all levels (National, State, regional including conflict affected areas) and to secure commitments to CSE</li> </ol>
<b>Immediate outcomes: 2.2</b>	Strengthened capacities to deliver SRHR information that reaches women, young people, adolescents, minorities and other and marginalised groups, including those affected by conflict and disasters
Output 2.2.1	Increased capacity of Government, national and civil society organisations and networks to deliver rights based, gender responsive comprehensive sexuality education for in and out of school young people
Activities	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Training and mentoring of teachers, health workers and EHOs, CSOs in selected States and Regions to provide CSE for young people in and out of school using integrated standard curriculum.</li> <li>2. Dissemination of information on CSE targeting Government, Schools, Teachers, caregivers of students, civil society and local organisations as well as for adolescents and youth</li> <li>3. Engaging innovative pedagogical methods to enable roll out of the CSE modules in a culturally and socially acceptable way</li> </ol>
Output 2.2.2	Community of practice around the provision of Comprehensive Sexuality Education that address cultural and systemic barriers to SRHR.
Activities	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Establish a community of practice in partnership with the local consortia, Adolescent and Youth Platform and key stakeholders to exchange information, lessons learnt and good practices around CSE;</li> <li>2. Support evidence based advocacy interventions to enhance local ownership and the visibility of CSE as key component of SRHR.</li> </ol>



**Intermediate Outcome 3: Enhanced access to sexual and reproductive health services that are gender responsive, adolescent-friendly, and meet the standards for quality care and equity in access**

<p><b>Immediate Outcome 3.1</b></p>	<p>Strengthened capacities to deliver SRHR services that reach women, young people, adolescents, minorities and other marginalized groups, including those affected by conflict and disasters</p>
<p>Output 3.1.1</p>	<p>Strengthened capacity of service delivery points (public, private) to provide SRHR services including youth friendly health services in selected states/regions.</p>
<p>Activities</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Support the adaptation and utilization of AYFHS Manual in both public and private health care facilities including youth and women and girls centers</li> <li>2. Training of health workers and EHOs, CSOs on Adolescent and Youth Friendly Health Services and ASRHR.</li> </ol>
<p>Output 3.1.2</p>	<p>Government budget allocation for family planning commodities procurement and Supply Chain Management to the Department of Public Health</p>
<p>Activities</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Strengthen quality improvement teams for inventory management and reproductive health commodity security through expansion of reproductive health Logistic Management Information System (LMIS) to target states and regions.</li> <li>2. Capacity building to assist sustained procurement and commodity provision for public and private health facilities</li> <li>3. . Consultations with Government to support development of an effective, realistic and gender responsive budget for the allocation and management and family planning commodities procurement</li> <li>4. Technical support to strengthen health systems including the collection and analysis of data</li> </ol>

<b>Immediate Outcome 3.2</b>	Strengthened capacities to deliver SRHR information that reaches women, young people, adolescents, minorities and other and marginalized groups, including those affected by conflict and disasters
Output 3.2.1	Increased demand for SRHR information and CSE for young people through innovative interventions
Activities	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Integrate innovative approaches in delivery of services at adolescent and youth friendly health service delivery points, including EHOs in conflict affected areas.</li> <li>2. Regular update content of the Mobile App and monitor utilization to respond to the need of young people.</li> </ol>
Output 3.2.2	Strengthened localized coordination of SRHR
